This week we are introducing an exciting new feature on our newsletter! Each week we will share information on a different curriculum area within school. This week we are looking at **Phonics**.



The journey to start reading begins as soon as your child starts school in nursery! As well as developing a love of reading through stories, puppets and role play, children take part in a range of listening games and activities to tune them into environmental sounds, instrumental sounds, rhythm and rhyme. These games are vital in preparing children for when they begin their **Read Write Inc** phonics journey.

In EYFS and KS1 RWI phonics is taught at a level to match each child's individual abilities. Reading strategies taught in specific groups are essential in ensuring children are able to access the wider curriculum.

In their groups, children are taught to recognise and read letter sounds, blend them together and read words – real and nonsense. This skill of reading words is then extended into reading books which are phonetically matched to your child's ability. Gradually words become phrases, which extend to sentences and then more complex sentences. The children practise this skill of reading in guided reading sessions and at home with families. The books children bring home should match their phonics level. When reading fluency children work on accuracy, comprehension. Whilst on the RWI programme children are assessed every half term to see if they are ready to progress to the next level group.

As well as using phonic skills to read, children are taught skills to use the sounds when spelling. You may hear your child talk about Fred finger spelling. This is where they will pinch the sounds in the words using their fingers eg t-e-n-t and then write the sounds down. Children have access to sound mats or sound wall charts to support them with this in class right up to Y6.



If you have any questions about phonics please speak to your child's class teacher. Also keep a look out for an opportunity to come and see phonics in action in school. Dates for this will be shared in a separate School Spider email.





Strive for 5!




Mrs Unsworth and Mrs Clegg
